

Outcomes / Indicators

Short-term

Established committee that includes all those engaged in providing emergency food programs.

Established committee of organizations who will provide support/services to shelter clients.

Established working group to do a scan of local organizations that offer volunteer opportunities.

Seniors' representation on existing Older Adults subcommittee.

Intermediate

Identification of gaps and opportunities for enhanced coordination of existing food access programs and funding sources to enhance existing programs and/or create new ones. Increased awareness among partners and populations in-need about available emergency food programs.

Clear pathways for health and social services/support for shelter clients. Campaign to raise awareness of the state of homelessness to increase community readiness prior to the opening of the shelter.

Environmental scan within Dryden and Machin that identifies organizations offering volunteer opportunities. Established methods to promote volunteer opportunities identified.

Coordination and promotion of activities for older adults to reduce isolation and increase safety (including arts, cultural, recreation activities and emergency preparedness).

Long-term

Increased:

- Capacity of existing emergency food access programs and/or new ones to serve populations in-need.
- Access to emergency housing (as per KDSB plan), coordination of services/support for those in need of emergency housing and community receptiveness and support for a shelter.
- Awareness of opportunities to volunteer.
- Opportunities to access activities that increase safety and reduce isolation among older adults and awareness of those activities.
